

The Parliamentary Library offers two summer research scholarships for postgraduate students each year. Scholars work alongside specialist researchers in the Parliamentary Library in Canberra for a period of six weeks to produce a report on a topic of relevance to the Library's research program.

Research topics

In 2023, the Library is seeking applications from students who have an interest in and knowledge of the following topics or a related area:

Politics and public administration

- Trust in political institutions: are Australia's political institutions still trusted and effective?
- Identity politics: the effect on political debate in Australia and political narratives on the conservative and progressive sides.

Science, technology, environment, and resources

- Regenerative agriculture: tools to improve soil and landscape health and protect against the impacts of climate change.
- Grid management: issues in managing the energy grid in the transition to renewable energy.
- Anti-microbial resistance: managing the threat of antimicrobial resistance for Australia.

- Renewables and energy storage: best storage options for Australia.
- Trust in science: how does Australia view science, research, and expertise? Are we working to our full potential?

Social policy and media policy

- A Makaratta Commission and Treaties: options for Australia's response.
- Regional news media: and the decline in locally produced public interest news.
- Mis- and disinformation: and the decline in locally produced public interest news.
- **Migration:** impacts on Australia over the past 30 years.
- Australian news media and digital platforms: current issues and outlook.

Economics

- Australia's trading future: Australia's trade in the changing trade environment.
- Macroeconomics: the goals and available tools for monetary and fiscal policy in the modern economic order.
- Currency: the future of money in Australia, and the role of digital currencies in a cashless economy
- Economics of the environment: options for using environmental markets to achieve climate change mitigation.

- Taxation: options for using and regulating blockchain and AI to improve tax system integrity.
- Government intervention: the role for government intervention (policy, programs, regulation, investment) in markets in the modern Australian economy.
- Superannuation: is Australian superannuation achieving its public policy objectives?

When do the scholarships occur?

The Summer Research Scholarship is generally undertaken during the summer academic recess. Scholars are based in the Parliamentary Library in Canberra from Monday 9 January until Friday 17 February 2023. Scholars submit their research report on or before Friday 21 April 2023. Should there be any COVID-19 restrictions at the time of commencement, consideration may be given for the scholarship to be undertaken at an alternative time.

Elements of the scholarship

To successfully fulfil the requirements of the scholarship, recipients must:

- be based in the Parliamentary Library for a period of six weeks
- present a short work-in-progress seminar
- produce a research report on one topic (5,000-8,000 words).

Summer Research Scholars also participate in a number of activities during the scholarship period, including:

- an induction program where scholars learn about the role of the Parliamentary Library, its
 place in the parliamentary environment, and the purpose and style of its research
 publications
- research section meetings as appropriate and other Library activities
- functions with summer research scholars from the National Library of Australia and the Australian War Memorial and
- a guided tour of Parliament House.

For the period of the scholarship in Canberra, scholars will be provided with a fully equipped workstation (phone, internet, email) and access to a printer. Scholars may discuss any requirements for specialised software.

Upon successful completion of the placement, an honorarium of \$1,800 will be awarded to scholars.

About the Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarship

Do I need to be studying in an area related to the research topic?

Applicants do not need to be studying in an area directly related to the research topics nominated. However, applicants do need to demonstrate their knowledge in the area, relevant research skills, and prepare a research proposal detailing how they will approach the topic.

Can I select my own topic?

Applicants can propose their own topic, but it should have some connection to the topics listed.

Why should I apply?

The Parliamentary Library is a unique research environment, and the Summer Research Scholarship allows scholars to understand and work within this important national institution. The scholarship also gives recipients the opportunity to:

- build research expertise
- contribute to scholarship on the Parliament and its work
- receive training and access the Library's specialist collections and databases
- interact with subject-matter experts and
- be guided by a mentor who will provide advice during the scholarship.

Who can apply?

The Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarship is open to postgraduate students studying at an Australian tertiary institution who have successfully completed at least one year (FTE) of postgraduate study. Applicants must be Australian citizens and be enrolled at the time of the scholarship.

Selection criteria

Applicants do not need to directly address the selection criteria in their applications, but they should demonstrate the following:

- a quality research proposal on one of the identified topics or a related topic
- strong research skills
- excellent written communication skills
- an ability to work within set guidelines and to deadlines and
- a capacity to work effectively within a professional research environment.

Selection process

Applications for the 2022 Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarship will close at midnight on Monday **26 September 2022**. Applicants will be assessed by the selection panel and those short-listed will be scheduled for a telephone interview. Successful applicants will be notified in November 2022.

Other issues to note

Assistance

The Parliamentary Library is unable to provide any assistance (financial or otherwise) with travel or accommodation in relation to the scholarship.

Should there be any COVID-19 restrictions, at the time of commencement some changes to the 2023 Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarship may need to be implemented at short notice. The continued health and safety of our staff, visitors, and other building occupants remains the top priority for the Parliamentary Library.

About the Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarship

National Health advice and associated travel restrictions may place constraints on some applicants, and there may be unanticipated changes to arrangements at late notice. If for any reason border closures are in place in January 2023, scholars will be required to apply for any relevant border crossing applications.

Relationship between the scholar and the Library

The relationship between the Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholars and the Department of Parliamentary Services will not be one of employer and employee, and no employee benefits will arise for the Summer Research Scholars. Scholars will be covered for all work health and safety issues for the duration of their placement and as such are required to abide by all Department of Parliamentary Services work health and safety policies and procedures.

Scholars will not have direct dealings with the Parliamentary Library's clients, undertake work directly related to client inquiries, or be involved in any activity that would breach the confidentiality provisions of the *Parliamentary Services Act 1999*.

Scholars will, for the period of the scholarship, be assigned a mentor with whom they can discuss their research. The mentor will be a specialist researcher in the Parliamentary Library and will oversee the scholar's work and progress.

Ownership of work

The Parliamentary Library will retain the ability to use, reproduce, adapt, modify, distribute or communicate any work produced by scholars. In some instances, research papers may be accepted for publication. If accepted for publication, the paper will be published online as part of the Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholar series, and copyright in the scholar's paper will be owned by the Commonwealth. Scholars may of course request permission to republish the paper for their own purposes.

Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholars are required to acknowledge the support of the Parliamentary Library in any publication or other material resulting from the research they undertake during the scholarship. They may be required to deposit with the Library a copy of their thesis, other publication or subsequent research outcome arising from the scholarship.

Pre-commencement requirements

Prior to commencing the scholarship, recipients must:

- obtain a police record check so a security pass can be issued for access to the non-public areas of Parliament House and
- agree to meet and maintain the standards of behaviour, conduct and confidentiality in accordance with the Parliamentary Service Values and Parliamentary Service Code of Conduct under the *Parliamentary Service Act 1999*.

Preparing your application

Applications for the 2023 Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarships must include the following documents.

Application form

Applicants must complete all sections of the 2023 Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarship application form.

Academic transcript

Certified copies of academic transcripts for all undergraduate and postgraduate study are to be attached to the application form. Documents can be certified by individuals identified in Schedule 2 of the Statutory Declarations Regulations 1993 (Commonwealth) available at www.legislation.gov.au. The certifying statement should be as follows:

'This is a true copy of the original documents sighted by me.'

Certifier's qualification

Curriculum vitae

Applicants can format their *curriculum vitae* in any manner they wish, but it should include details of any qualifications, previous employment, other research awards previously held, and a list of published or unpublished work.

Research proposal

Each application must be accompanied by a research proposal up to 1,000 words (not including footnotes or references), which outlines how the applicant proposes to approach one of the identified research topics or a related topic. This proposal should include:

- a draft outline of the scope of the work
- · discussion of methodology
- identification of areas of relevant literature
- any suggestions on novel ways in which the topic might be approached or treated
- a statement on how working in the Parliamentary Library will contribute to the content/quality of the research.

The purpose of this proposal is to assist the selection panel to understand your ideas and approach to research. For successful applicants, the final scope and shape of the research project will be discussed and agreed upon at the commencement of the scholarship.

Referee reports

Applications must include referee reports from two academic or professional referees. Each referee report must be attached to a referee report form, which must be signed by the referee and the applicant.

Submitting your application

Applications for the 2022 Parliamentary Library Summer Research Scholarship will close at midnight on Monday **26 September 2022**. Applications are to be submitted by email to: parliamentary.librarian@aph.gov.au. All applications will be acknowledged within one working day of receipt. No late applications will be considered.
